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## Module 7: Designing and Evaluating Classroom Summative Assessments

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### Module 7 Overview

This resource is designed as a support for local facilitators who plan to lead Community of Practice (CoP) meetings for educators who have participated in the asynchronous, online professional learning in the Minnesota Data and Assessment Literacy (MnDAL), Strand 2, Module 7 for educators. This resource provides an optional and flexible structure for a collaborative discussion that can extend and apply learning from the module to the local context. Facilitators may adapt this resource to meet their own needs.

Module 7 is focused on bringing together ideas related to eliciting quality evidence and analyzing and responding to student work. We applied and expanded on these ideas in order to explore what makes a high-quality classroom summative assessment. We explored the quality of classroom tests and other assessment tools that are analyzed with an answer key, scoring guide, or rubric to produce a score, grade, or formal feedback.

- Understand what constitutes a high-quality classroom summative assessment.
- Learn how to evaluate the quality of an assessment and how to improve an assessment through an assessment cycle.

### Module 7: Community of Practice—Facilitator’s Agenda

Estimated Time	Activity
5 min	<p><b>Welcome</b></p> <p>Review the CoP Learning Goals, Success Criteria, and agenda.</p> <p>Introduce and establish norms (norms previously established can be posted somewhere as a reminder).</p>
10 min	<p><b>Sharing</b></p> <p>Each participant takes about two minutes to share their experiences, thoughts, and questions about Module 7. (If necessary, you can break into small groups to fit this within a 10-minute window.)</p> <p>Suggested Prompts:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Was there something in the content for Module 7 that stood out to you?</li> <li>• What tools did you find useful and engaging?</li> </ul>
30 min	<p><b>The Final Word Discussion Protocol</b></p> <p>Each participant should have a copy of the article “Quality Classroom Summative Assessments” from Activity 7.2.</p>

Estimated Time	Activity
	<p>Participants read their copy of the article and underline or highlight parts of the text that resonate with them or feel particularly significant in the context of the assessment practices in their own school or district (approximately 15 minutes).</p> <p>Divide participants into small groups of 3 to 5 members. Explain that groups will be using The Final Word discussion protocol. (If meeting virtually, consider using breakout rooms.)</p> <p>In small groups, one participant begins by sharing a quote from the text. The participant will have no more than three minutes to share why they selected the quote.</p> <p>Next, the other participants in the group each have one minute to share a response to the quote. The purpose of the response is to expand on the original participant’s ideas, offer a different perspective, or clarify thinking about the quote. Crosstalk and conversation is not allowed.</p> <p>When all participants have shared their one-minute responses, the original participant who shared the quote can have the “final word” and have one minute to share their thoughts and reflections. The purpose of their final response is to share reactions to what was discussed and to reveal new thinking that may have resulted.</p> <p>Continue following the protocol until each participant has had the opportunity to share a quote from the text.</p>
10 min	<p><b>Whole Group Discussion</b></p> <p>Volunteers share their thoughts about the following questions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• What new thinking about classroom summative assessments was generated in your group?</li> <li>• What topics from the article or group discussion need additional investigation?</li> </ul> <p>After participants have shared their ideas, facilitate a discussion about next steps for collaborative validation of assessments.</p>
5 min	<p><b>Closing Reflection on the CoP</b></p> <p>As a group, discuss the following questions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• What worked for us? Do we need to change our approach at our next CoP?</li> <li>• What are your key takeaways that you want to reflect and/or act on?</li> <li>• Are there any assessment practices you are likely to change in your classroom?</li> </ul>

5 min	<p><b>Closing Reflection on the CoP</b></p> <p>Consider the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• What worked for us? Do we need to change our approach at our next CoP?</li> <li>• What are your key takeaways that you want to reflect and/or act on?</li> <li>• Are there any assessment practices you are likely to change in your classroom?</li> </ul>
