

Understanding Statewide Testing Resources:

Achievement Level Descriptors

Purpose

The MCAs are designed to assess students' knowledge, skills, and abilities in the areas of reading, mathematics, and science according to the Minnesota K-12 Academic Standards. There are four MCA achievement levels that correspond to the Minnesota K-12 Academic Standards: Does Not Meet the Standards, Partially Meets the Standards, Meets the Standards, and Exceeds the Standards.

Achievement level descriptors (ALDs) describe the knowledge, skills, and abilities a student should be able to master at each achievement level for the standards. Students' MCA test results are reported by achievement level, and the ALDs present a clearer picture of a student's level of mastery. Students who meet or exceed the standards are considered proficient in the knowledge, skills, and abilities set forth in the Minnesota K-12 Academic Standards.

Application

If an educator or a parent would like to know the knowledge, skills, and abilities a student demonstrated on the MCAs, they can refer to the <u>ALDs</u>. These guidelines provide descriptions of grade-level student performance at each of the achievement levels. The ALDs are provided in two formats. The traditional vertical format goes through each achievement level and strand. The <u>ALD Map</u> is organized in a horizontal format for educators to see all achievement level descriptions on one page.

The ALDs can be used alongside the Minnesota K-12 Academic Standards to help educators make informed decisions on curriculum and the scope and sequence of lessons.

- How can teachers, parents, and students use the ALDs to support in the interpretation of the <u>Individual Student Reports</u>?
- How can teachers use the ALDs to impact classroom instruction throughout the year?
 - Does my classroom curriculum and instructional materials fully teach the depth and breadth of the Minnesota K-12 Academic Standards?
 - Are students responding to my classroom instruction with a level of understanding that is at or above the Meets the Standards achievement level?
